Over the last decade, the scenario of European ethnographic museums has been slowly changing, taking into consideration wide-ranging topics that would theoretically assist institutions to discover "the next step" for their work. The debate surrounding postcolonialism became a hot topic in the museological sphere, and talks over restitution, provenance research, among other delicate topics, became the keywords in any ethnographic meeting as they would dictate the approach of professionals towards the collections held in Europe. More parti-cularly in Germany, debates intensified after the "long summer of provenance research", articulating complex topics regarding colonial entanglements, heritage, and possible reparations. The workshop seeks to better comprehend the circumstances and recent happenings in the museum sphere, with the particular goal of merging practice and scholarly theory.

The workshop intends to contribute to the European museum decolonizing effort and shall provide a space for discussing shortcomings, strategies, developments, and realities from the inside of museum institutions, as well as scholar perspectives. A special focus will be on collection management and exhibition design – museum professional experience, provenance research and colonial heritage – museology collection theories, and engaging the archive – digitalization and data management.
